Conference program presents new approach to offering library services: The Personal Information Trainer

The Social Science Division will be featuring cutting-edge ideas from **Stuart Basefsky**, Director of the IWS News Bureau, Institute for Workplace Studies at Cornell University. Please plan to attend "The Personal Information Trainer: Library Training as an Employee Benefit for Attraction and Retention of Targeted Individuals in the Firm or Institution" which will be held on Monday, June 4, 2007 from 11:30 to 1:00. The program is co-sponsored with the Insurance & Employee Benefits Division and is graciously sponsored by Thomson Gale.

Basefsky will present a focused look at the potential for offering specialized library services to a pre-selected group of employees and how this benefits all parties concerned. He will present work place examples, suggest how libraries deal with policy issues, present a checklist for implementation, and discuss the long-term consequences. The main presentation will be followed with counterpoint from two designated reactors. **Heidi Yacker** from Congressional Research Service, Library of Congress and **John Ganly** from The New York Public Library, Science, Industry and Business Library will offer their reactions. **Cynthia Hill** from Sun Microsystems will moderate the program.

The Geography and Map Section invites everyone to join us at the annual conference in Denver. The Denver conference promises to be a great learning experience and a lot of fun, so please join your colleagues from the Geography and Map section for the conference.

On Monday, June 4 from 1:30-3:00 pm the Geography and Map Section's **Mary Murphy Papers** session will focus on the theme of **Mapping Business**. **Angela Lee** from ESRI Inc. will speak on the use of Geographic Information Systems in business applications. The program will explore the use of GIS for analysis and mapping of Consumer Expenditure Surveys and business location data.

On Wednesday, June 6 from 1:00-2:30 pm the Geography and Map section will join with the Government Information Division and Transportation Division to sponsor the **Government Mapping and Information Update**. This session will cover digital systems, plans and programs including the U.S. Government Printing Office Future Digital Systems (FDsys), the U.S. Census Bureau's "On The Map" and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's animal health tracking system. **Rick Davis** and **Selene Dalecky** from GPO, **John Carpenter** from the Census Bureau, and **Susan Maroney** from USDA will discuss their systems and the applications for libraries.

On Wednesday, June 6 from 3:00-4:30 pm the Social Science Division sections will each have time for a meeting and roundtable discussion of plans for the coming year. The Geography and Map section will discuss topics for section programs at the 2008 annual conference in Seattle. In addition section members will discuss Geography and Map representation on the Cartographic Users Advisory Council (CUAC) and on the Geography and Map Libraries Section of the International Federation of Library Associations (IFLA). Recent efforts to recruit new section representatives for CUAC and IFLA have been unsuccessful. Section members will need to discuss the future of G & M representation for these groups.


<u>Taking the Sting out of Stat (Again): Visualizing Information</u> Elana Broch, Stokes Library, Princeton University

For those of you who have attended my sessions at SLA, I have hopefully begun to convince you of the importance of statistics in the work of many librarians. You remember how much fun we had learning about statistics.


We talked about summarizing information in many different ways,

including a discussion of bar charts, historgrams, and scatterplots. This year, because I think it so important to feel comfortable displaying statistical information in a way that is engaging and informative to the user, we'll spend the entire session of visualizing information.

We'll cover bar charts, histograms, and scatterplots again and introduce new techniques such as stem and leaf diagrams and box and whisker plots. We also spend time discussing how to determine which type of visual representation is best for a particular type of data.

NAFTA at 13: Unruly Teen or Happily Ever Afta

Be sure to point them to the NAFTA's history tab in Wikipedia which lists the hundred of sometimes contentious comments on this highly controversial topic. Not only can they learn something about NAFTA, but about the issues of using Wikipedia as a source.

Our panel of experts will help us locate impartial information about NAFTA about their respective countries. With immigration reform and the economy key issues in the 2008 election, our presenters will be sure to provide useful information.
